





Figure 1: Composition of Prisons population

# LEGACY OF LEADERSHIP: HONORING GEN. ARONDA NYAKAIRIMA'S CONTRIBUTIONS TO UGANDA'S SECURITY AND DEVELOPMENT

The inaugural Kampala Defence and Security Expo 2024 took place at Speke Resort Munyonyo, presided over by His Excellency President Yoweri Kaguta Museveni.

his three-day event, organized by Ministry of Defence and Veteran Affairs (MODVA) and Ministry of Internal Affairs (MIA), not only showcased the Uganda's security and defense capabilities but also honored the enduring legacy of Gen. Aronda Nyakairima, former Minister of Internal Affairs and Chief of Defence Forces, marking the first annual memorial since his passing in 2015. The expo celebrated Gen. Aronda as a "paragon of revolutionary sacrifice, Pan-Africanism, patriotism, and courage," acknowledging his role in shaping the country's security landscape and socio-economic transformation.

The event highlighted Uganda's growing self-reliance in defense, security, and industrial production, showcasing military hardware, cutting-edge equipment, and innovative defense solutions. President Museveni inaugurated the event by touring various exhibits, including those from the

Uganda People's Defence Forces (UPDF), Uganda Police Force (UPF), and Uganda Prisons Service (UPS). Each service demonstrated its unique contributions to national security, underlining Uganda's ability to produce military and security resources locally.

The Uganda Prisons Service (UPS) exhibition stood out, emphasizing its engagement in agriculture, manufacturing, and vocational skilling programs. UPS showcased inmate-produced items such as uniforms, maize seed varieties, furniture, and art and crafts, which not only serve internal needs but also align with the national Buy Uganda, Build Uganda (BUBU) initiative. President Museveni praised these efforts, particularly noting the role of UPS in promoting local production and self sufficiency, a core tenet of his vision for Uganda's economic growth.



# PASS OUT OF 70 PRISON OFFICERS ON JUNIOR COMMAND AND STAFF COURSE

The Uganda Prisons Service (UPS) celebrated a major milestone in its ongoing professionalization efforts with the passing-out of 70 officers from the Junior Command and Staff Course at the Prisons Academy and Training School in Luzira. The event was graced by the Minister of Internal Affairs, Maj. Gen. (Rtd) Kahinda Otafiire, who commended the officers on completing the rigorous training and stepping into key leadership roles within UPS.

n his address, Maj. Gen. Otafiire congratulated the graduates, emphasizing the responsibilities and expectations tied to their new roles as Principal Officers. "You have undergone intense preparation for leadership roles," he stated. "As Principal Officers, you will oversee the daily management and operations of the Prison Service."

He encouraged them to continue utilizing UPS's capacity-building initiatives to excel and maintain high standards of rehabilitation and public service. Stressing the importance of effective rehabilitation, he noted, "Nobody is born a criminal; crimes result from environmental factors." He commended Dr. Johnson Byabashaija, the Commissioner General of Prisons, for UPS's achievements in rehabilitation and achieving the lowest recidivism rate in Africa.

Ensure stability, peace, and prosperity within their communities

Promote patriotism and democratic values

Share ideas and foster harmony within UPS and beyond

He concluded by inspiring the graduates to carry on the legacy of UPS's leadership, stating, "You are now part of the leadership that will shape the future of our nation."

UPS, under Dr. Byabashaija's leadership, has undertaken significant reforms in its transformation from a punitive institution to a correctional and productive service. As part of this evolution, UPS has prioritized staff development to support its mission of safe custody and offender rehabilitation. The Junior Command and Staff Course equips officers with essential command and leadership skills, preparing them to effectively manage and supervise operations across the service.

Dr. Byabashaija highlighted several UPS achievements, including progress in staff housing and prisoner holding capacity:

Construction of 1,577 staff housing units since FY2020/21, increasing the proportion of adequately housed staff from 31.8% to 48.9%.

Currently, 582 staff houses are under construction across multiple locations, including Luzira, Ruimi, and Mityana.

Expansion of prisoner holding capacity, now accommodating up to 21,126 inmates, with new wards expected by January 2025.

Additionally, UPS is part of a joint infrastructure project with the Uganda Police Force and the Directorate of Citizenship and Immigration Control, aimed at constructing 69,000 housing units, with 15,000 dedicated to UPS staff.

Since 2005, UPS has trained 518 officers through the Junior Command and Staff Course, with over 3,442 officers benefiting from specialized courses in the past three years.

The Acting Commandant of the Prisons Academy, ACP Mary Centenary, congratulated the graduating class, which included 60 male and 10 female officers from diverse UPS stations. She lauded their discipline and resilience during the 14-module training and acknowledged the support of their families, trainers, and UPS leadership.

**Best in Discipline:** PO II Fred Bumbirya for his calm demeanor, smartness, and respect.

**Best in Academics (Male):** PO II Posiano Nasiima for his academic excellence and open-mindedness.

**Best Overall (Male):** PO II Siragi Kapere, recognized for his teamwork, discipline, and leadership.

**Best Overall (Female):** PO II Jane Frances Amusugut for her maturity, humility, and sound decision-making.





## A VISION FOR EXCELLENCE IN UPS: STRATEGIC AND POLICY ENHANCEMENT TOUR HELD IN NORTH WESTERN REGION PRISONS

Can. Dr. Johnson Byabashaija, the Commissioner General of Prisons (CGP), successfully concluded a comprehensive working tour of the North Western Region, marking a step towards enhancing the operational capabilities of the Uganda Prisons Service (UPS).

his tour, which included visits to multiple facilities, aimed to inspect prison operations, engage with staff and inmates, and highlighting the vision, mission, and values of the UPS.

The tour commenced at UG. Prison Yumbe, where Dr. Byabashaija inspected ongoing construction projects, specifically a new prison ward designed to alleviate overcrowding. This initiative is part of UPS's broader strategy to enhance rehabilitation efforts and improve the living conditions of inmates. During his visit, he addressed the inmates, emphasizing UPS's commitment to their welfare. He urged them to maintain high standards of sanitation, hygiene, and discipline, which are vital for a conducive rehabilitation environment.

Furthermore, the CGP highlighted the importance of access to justice, reminding inmates of the various opportunities available to them, including legal assistance and rehabilitation programs aimed at reintegrating them into society upon release.

Following his interactions with inmates, Dr. Byabashaija held a crucial meeting with prison staff at the station, emphasizing the importance of discipline, professionalism, and integrity within the service. He encouraged the officers to actively pursue career growth through specialized training courses tailored for Non-Commissioned Officers. The CGP noted that the stability of the nation, along with ongoing salary enhancement initiatives, would foster a positive work environment conducive to professional development.

Dr. Byabashaija also took the opportunity to engage with staff spouses, advocating for their economic empowerment. He urged them to explore income-generating activities to supplement household income, reflecting the UPS's commitment to supporting the families of its personnel. This focus on family welfare aligns with the UPS's vision of fostering a supportive and inclusive community.

The Commissioner General continued his tour with a visit to UG. Prison Moyo, where he conducted a thorough inspection of the facility. He offered guidance and counseling to the inmates, stressing the importance of accessing justice and encouraging them to take full advantage of the rehabilitation opportunities offered.

The final leg of Dr. Byabashaija's tour took him to UG. Prison Farm Adjumani, a model facility for agricultural and livestock production. Upon arrival, he was welcomed with a quarter guard parade mounted by staff at the entrance, symbolizing discipline and professionalism of the UPS.

At Adjumani, the CGP inspected the prison's livestock management and production project, which includes cross-breeding, animal fattening, and the production of milk and beef. The section currently boasts a herd of 201 cattle, including Boran, Siwal, Brahman, and cross-bred Ankole and Zebu breeds. This initiative not only supports the prison's self-sufficiency but also contributes to the local economy by providing employment and training opportunities for inmates as a rehabilibitation tool.

Additionally, Dr. Byabashaija reviewed the prison's cotton production project, gaining insights into agronomic processes and post-harvest handling techniques. Adjumani Prison also engages in commercial maize production, agricultural mechanization, and agroforestry, showcasing UPS's commitment to sustainability and socio-economic transformation.

During his visit to both the female and male inmate sections at Adjumani Prison, Dr. Byabashaija commended the inmates on their smartness and adherence to hygiene and sanitation standards. He offered words of motivation, emphasizing the importance of discipline and hard work in achieving personal rehabilitation goals. He reiterated the UPS's vision of providing human rights-based correctional services, urging inmates to utilize Functional Adult Literacy (FAL) programs as part of their rehabilitation process.

The Commissioner General praised the staff at Adjumani Prison for their dedication and professionalism, encouraging them to prioritize their health through regular medical check-ups. He emphasized the significance of maintaining a healthy workforce to ensure optimal performance within the prison system. Dr. Byabashaija also urged both junior and senior officers to pursue career growth through new human resource development initiatives introduced by UPS.

The tour culminated in a meeting with the officers in charge of prisons in the North West Region, where discussions focused on ensuring the

well-being and security of both staff and inmates.

The CGP highlighted the importance of administrative quidelines, adherence to observation of human rights, and the need to boost productivity within the prisons. He also addressed effective strategies for rehabilitation reintegration of inmates, infrastructural development, preventing prisoner escapes, and improving overall staff and inmate management.

As part of its corporate social responsibility and commitment to national development, the Uganda Prisons Service (UPS), led by Deputy Commissioner General of Prisons Mr. Samuel Akena, made a historic visit to Rwot David Acana II, the Paramount Chief of the Acholi cultural institution, at his palace in Gulu City.

he visit symbolized a significant partnership aimed at strengthening ties between the UPS and the Acholi chiefdom, with a shared commitment to transforming Northern Uganda into an agricultural hub.

UPS, traditionally known for its custodial role, has also become a major force in agriculture, running extensive farming operations across Uganda. This partnership with the Acholi cultural institution highlights the region's agricultural potential and UPS's commitment to community development. During the visit, UPS donated 1,000 tonnes of high-quality maize seed, 2,000 tonnes of commercial maize grain, and livestock, including Boran cattle, as part of a shared mission to enhance food security in the Acholi sub-region.

Mr. Akena emphasized the importance of the partnership in aligning with national values and the 1995 Constitution's recognition of cultural institutions. "We come in peace and partnership," he said, underscoring the UPS's two-decade contribution to Northern Uganda's peace recovery and socioeconomic transformation. "Our agricultural production thrives in this region, with extensive operations in Kitgum, Amuru, Nyoya, Gulu, and Pader, and we are committed to building sustainable livelihoods alongside our custodial duties."

Such visits are vital as they foster understanding and collaboration, particularly in Northern Uganda, a region with rich agricultural potential. The UPS's involvement aligns with broader government initiatives, including fulfilling presidential directives on seed multiplication and developing Aswa Ranch

"This visit marks a new chapter," he said. "We've moved beyond conflict resolution and now focus on socio-economic development. While land disputes remain a challenge, we are committed to sustainable growth that benefits our people and aligns with national goals."

The Paramount Chief applauded UPS's corporate social responsibility and outreach programs, especially the presence of prison farms that contribute to community empowerment.

"We knew Uganda Prisons as an institution responsible for the custody of offenders, but I'm impressed with their community engagement strategies," Acana remarked. 

ccompanied by Mrs. Margaret Orik Obonyo, Assistant Commissioner of Prisons and Regional Prison Commander for Northern Region, Rwot Acana toured the farm's extensive coffee plantations, examining innovative rehabilitation programs, post-harvest handling techniques, and state-of-the-art pulping machinery. The visit aimed to leverage UPS's expertise in coffee cultivation to bolster the agricultural capacity of the Acholi region.

As part of its economic empowerment initiatives, UPS is also producing coffee seedlings for neighboring community members, fostering a spirit of collaboration and sustainability. "This partnership will boost our coffee industry, empowering our people economically," Mrs. Orik stated during the visit, highlighting the vital role of coffee growing in providing income and economic stability for the Acholi people.

Uganda Prisons Service (UPS) joined over 800 corrections leaders, policymakers, and experts from 70 countries at the 26th Annual Conference of the International Corrections and Prisons Association (ICPA), held in Singapore from September 1 to 6, 2024.

his year's conference, themed "Enabling Desistance: Beyond Recidivism," brought participants together to discuss global innovations, challenges, and best practices in corrections and rehabilitation. Uganda's delegation, led by Dr. George Muge, Assistant Commissioner General of Prisons (Director of Corporations and Corporate Affairs), comprised several senior officers focused on advancing UPS' mission to promote safety, justice, and rehabilitation.

The conference's theme, "Enabling Desistance: Beyond Recidivism", emphasized transforming prison to reduce recidivism through rehabilitation and reintegration. The event included sessions on technological advancements in corrections, mental health and wellness, alternative sentencing, and innovative staff development practices, each providing UPS with new approaches for creating a safer, more inclusive society.

The Uganda Prisons Service team highlighted Uaanda's rehabilitation practices. particularly traditional conflict-resolution mechanisms like the Mato Oput (reconciliation) method. According Dr. Muge, to desistance-focused initiatives, based on evidence-based rehabilitation programs and restorative justice, serve as models for other countries facing high recidivism rates.

Among the event's standout sessions was the keynote speech by Singapore's Minister for Digital Development and Information, Josephine Teo, who stressed the importance of empowering inmates to reintegrate successfully into society. The first day of the conference coincided with the Yellow Ribbon Project's annual Prison Run, in which over 100 international delegates participated. The Yellow Ribbon Project, celebrating its 20th anniversary, is a highly regarded Singaporean initiative that fosters community support for ex-offenders.

### Key Insights for Uganda Prisons Service

The UPS delegation was inspired by technological advancements discussed at the conference, including digital tracking for inmate progress, virtual health services, and artificial intelligence (AI) applications for predictive analysis in prison management. Countries like Norway presented their approach of open prisons, which prioritize rehabilitation over punishment, resulting in some of the world's lowest recidivism rates.

For UPS, collaboration emerged as a crucial takeaway, with potential partnerships forming with the Singapore Prison Service (SPS) and Gabriela Slovakova's Yellow Ribbon Project, as well as the SAW Project, which promotes international corrections cooperation. As Dr. Muge expressed, "Collaborating with global partners will enhance our capacity to introduce innovative programs, expand staff training, and ultimately make Ugandan communities safer."

#### Challenges and Lessons Learned

While showcasing progress, delegates universally acknowledged several persistent challenges: prison overcrowding, underfunding for rehabilitation, and limited mental health support for inmates and staff. Experts emphasized that mental health care is essential for inmates' successful reintegration, which,

combined with better staff training and leadership development, can create safer prison environments.

UPS officials noted lessons they plan to bring home, such as reinforcing evidence-based rehabilitation programs, integrating technology in prison management, enhancing staff training, and creating more community partnerships for reintegration.

#### **Recommendations and Future Plans**

Based on the conference, the UPS team recommended several initiatives:

**1.Expand Rehabilitation Programs** – Strengthen existing programs by incorporating best practices from other countries.

**2.Invest in Staff Development** – Increase training in leadership and professional development to boost morale and improve outcomes.

**3.Integrate Technology** – Implement digital tools like inmate progress tracking, virtual health services, and AI for better management and prisoner care.

**4.Attend Future ICPA Conferences** – Given the positive experience, UPS plans to attend the ICPA 2025 Conference in Rwanda and showcase Uganda's advancements in rehabilitation.

onducted as part of the Junior Command Course, the training was led by Senior Commissioner of Prisons Mr. Frank Baine, who serves as Deputy Director of Corporate Communication Affairs (CCA) and UPS's Service Spokesperson. Mr. Baine emphasized that excellent customer care and public relations skills are central to the integrity and image of the service.

"As Prison officers, we must prioritize empathy, respect, and professionalism in our interactions with inmates, visitors, and the community," Mr. Baine stated. "Protecting human rights at all costs and upholding the positive image and reputation of the service is our utmost responsibility."

#### **Key Training Areas**

Participants engaged in modules on effective communication techniques, equipping them with

skills to convey information clearly and professionally. Conflict resolution sessions emphasized practical strategies to manage and de-escalate tensions, fostering a safer and more collaborative environment. The training also included media relations and presentation skills, helping personnel present a positive public image and communicate UPS's mission confidently.

In addition, the doctrine and interpersonal relationships module reinforced core values and teamwork, while mindset change sessions promoted empathy and professionalism, aiming to establish a culture rooted in respect and understanding within the service. These areas collectively enhance the capacity of UPS personnel to uphold high standards in their duties.



This training ensures that officers can manage complex situations, foster positive relationships with diverse stakeholders, and create a respectful and empathetic environment within the service. By applying these skills, UPS officers are equipped to improve inmate satisfaction, reduce conflicts, and enhance community engagement. This initiative aligns with UPS's mission to provide safe, secure, and humane custody of offenders while prioritizing human rights in correctional programs. UPS has invested in capacity-building efforts over the past two decades, delivering nationwide training sessions that prepare officers to deliver exemplary service and demonstrate effective leadership within the correctional framework.



The Upper Prisons Inmate School currently has a total enrollment of 824 prisoners, with 427 primary school students, 328 secondary school students, and 68 university students, marking a strong commitment to the government's vision for inclusive education and alignment with Sustainable Development Goal 4 on quality education.

These efforts by the Rotary Club of Kampala Springs and Uganda Prisons Service are reshaping perspectives on inmate rehabilitation, offering inmates the tools to rebuild their lives and reenter society with confidence, dignity, and purpose.

### **ENHANCED ACCESS TO JUSTICE IN UGANDA**

Justice Defenders, in partnership with the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), successfully concluded a 12-day intensive training program for inmate and staff paralegals in the Kampala Extra Region. This capacity-building initiative, held from September 2 to September 13, brought together 86 participants from four prison facilities: Upper Prison, Luzira Women's Prison, Kampala Remand, and Murchison Bay Prison.

ed by Justice Defenders Legal Practice Manager Ms. Joanita Asiimwe, the training focused on equipping paralegals with practical legal skills necessary to assist fellow inmates effectively within the complex criminal justice system. "This training is crucial in empowering our paralegals with the necessary skills to navigate the criminal justice system effectively," Asiimwe said. "By strengthening their knowledge and expertise, we can ensure that inmates receive adequate legal support and representation."

#### **Empowering Paralegals to Bridge Justice Gaps**

The role of paralegals within prisons cannot be overstated. Inmate paralegals act as a bridge between inmates and the often-overburdened legal system, ensuring that prisoners' rights are protected

and that they receive timely assistance. According to Mr. Herbert Kaheeru, Superintendent of Prisons at Murchison Bay, "Inmate paralegals are instrumental in promoting access to justice within prisons. They understand the prison environment and can effectively navigate the system, providing timely assistance to fellow inmates."

As part of the training, paralegals received instruction on critical skills, such as drafting and filing court documents, understanding legal office structures, data analysis, and applying advocacy skills. They also gained insight into the workings of the criminal justice system. This practical knowledge enables paralegals to offer services through the legal clinics established within the prisons, which provide:

Legal counseling and guidance Case management and tracking



Inmates actively participating in a paralegal training program

Document preparation (bail applications, appeals, etc.)

Mediation and dispute resolution Referrals to external legal aid services Prisoners' rights advocacy

Legal literacy and education initiatives

These clinics, run by inmate paralegals, serve as lifelines for prisoners seeking legal support, particularly in cases of bail applications, appeals, and mediation.

### A Proven Impact on Reducing Remand Times and Improving Justice

According to Uganda Prisons Service's (UPS) Strategic Investment Plan V, paralegal initiatives have already contributed to significant improvements in prisoner case management. Remand times for capital offenders have reduced from 18.3 months to 13 months, while the percentage of remand prisoners has decreased from 48.6% to 42.5%. The success of these programs is evident: all convicted prisoner appeals have been lodged and heard, indicating an effective streamlining of legal processes within Uganda's prisons.

Justice Defenders' work has also delivered broader benefits. Since its inception, the program has assisted over 35,000 inmates, providing access to legal aid,

support, and a greater understanding of their rights. UPS's open-door policy has fostered this collaboration, promoting transparency, enhancing service delivery, and encouraging partnerships with organizations dedicated to justice reform.

### Enhancing Prison Conditions and Supporting Rehabilitation

In addition to aiding in legal representation, the program contributes to prisoner rehabilitation and reintegration by teaching inmates essential skills. Paralegals learn to navigate Uganda's legal system, allowing them to become effective advocates for themselves and others. This role is a key part of rehabilitative efforts, enhancing prison conditions by providing inmates with tools for self-advocacy and fostering a culture of mutual support within prison units.

By increasing access to justice, reducing remand times, and empowering prisoners to participate actively in their legal processes, the program has paved the way for a more humane and efficient justice system within Uganda's prisons.


